A word from the Rector

"At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" He called a child, whom he put among them, and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such as a child in my name welcomes me." Matthew 18: 1-5

Have you wondered about greatness - what true greatness looks like? Is it merely the survival of the fittest and dismissal of the weakest? What is its source, and does it matter? How do Christians perceive greatness, and how does our perception shape our virtues and responses to the cultural dilemmas that occur all around us? Is greatness just a slogan - a sales pitch to get us to buy something, or an agenda to relieve to our fear of and anxiety over the future?

Jesus' disciples wanted to know about greatness, and precisely who would be the greatest in the kingdom. By calling a child and placing that child among them, Jesus gives them a visual image of greatness. He instructs his disciples to become like, to take the form of a young child, to identify and stand in unity and cohesion with them. That's what greatness should look like for those who follow Jesus. We are to identify with and seek to welcome the weakest, most vulnerable among us. We are to measure greatness based on our civility - how well we treat the most vulnerable members of society in whatever circumstance they maybe found. That's what makes the Representative Payee Program here at St. Matthew's such an important part of our ministry and outreach and overall an important part of Christian community.

Then and now we tend to romanticize our marginalized children and fail to comprehend their reality. Images of delightful children playing at the knees of a gentle Jesus are heartwarming, but not very accurate. Childhood in the Mediterranean culture of antiquity was a time of terror. Children were the weakest and most vulnerable, the first to suffer from dislocation, famine, war and disease. They had little status within their families and even less within the community. That's not to say children were not loved by their families. Times were difficult, and resources were limited. During this period of history, 60% of the children died before the age of 16.

We can see the same vulnerability and suffering in our current society. United States Child Poverty statics

These people have led such varied and interesting lives... please get to know them.



estimates 14 million children go to school and bed hungry every day here in one of the most affluent nations in the world. The poverty level for a family of four is \$24,000.00 is half of estimates of what it takes to cover basic expenses for a year. As nation we spend far less on programs to address poverty than any other developed nation. Consequences of our unwillingness to identify and stand with these children and families are great, and we know it.

Jesus makes a clear distinction between a humble, voiceless, vulnerable child and the competing, arguing, status seeking disciples – a distinction that still applies today. Jesus is rewriting for us the definition greatness. He calls us to become like children and to speak on behalf of those without a voice- who are of questionable status. The call to faithful discipleship is one to humble, vulnerable, service – a call to welcome and show hospitality for these who are the seeds of greatness in the kingdom of heaven.


Lessons from a farmer

Summer often reminds pastor Walter Wangerin Jr. of his father-in-law, a farmer. Farmers, he writes, remember "that we belong to the earth, and the earth belongs to God." Recalling his father-in-law working the fields, he states, "Surely I don't suppose that we shall live by the horse again, but I plead that we live on this earth with reverence."

Because God gave people "dominion" over creation (see Genesis 1:28), we are "God's emblem within the universe, God's signature upon the work he had accomplished," Wangerin writes. "We were placed here to serve God by serving the earth and so to be served by it."

Who demonstrates that better than a farmer nurturing soil and seeds to yield abundant harvest? "By his reverential stance," Wangerin concludes, "the farmer calls again for honor to God and kindness to creation, that we dress and till and keep it rightly."

The Council of Trustees, acting as the canonical Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, presents to the diocese two priests as candidates for the 10th bishop of the diocese:

The Rev. Martha N. Macgill,
Diocese of Maryland
The Rev. Helen Svoboda-Barber,
Diocese of North Carolina

The Search Committee had chosen three nominees, but one withdrew shortly after the slate was presented to the Council of Trustees, which oversees the election. Nominees may be added by a petition process (https://www.kansasbishopsearch.org/petition-process.html) that opens today and closes at 5 p.m. CDT on June 30, 2018.

Members of the diocese will have the chance to meet the candidates in walkabouts scheduled in the diocese for Oct. 2-5; the schedule of events is online at https://www.kansasbishopsearch.org/walkabouts.html.

The election of the next bishop will take place on the first day of Diocesan Convention, Oct. 19, at Grace Cathedral in Topeka. The Service of Ordination and Consecration is scheduled for March 2, 2019, at the cathedral, with Presiding Bishop Michael Bruce Curry officiating.

The Rev. Martha N. Macgill Rector, Emmanuel Episcopal Church, Cumberland, Maryland



The Rev. Martha N. Macgill was baptized and confirmed at Christ Church, Alexandria, Va., where she sang for several years in the junior choir. She attended St. Agnes Episcopal School in Alexandria for 12 years, where she graduated in 1976 as valedictorian.

She attended Davidson College, where she received a Bachelor of Arts, cum laude. After attending University of Virginia Law School (J.D.) and New York University Law School (L.LM. in Taxation), she practiced law in Connecticut and as a clerk at the United States Tax Court in Washington, DC.

Martha entered the ordination process in the Diocese of Virginia from St. Paul's, Alexandria, in 1990. She attended Virginia Theological Seminary, where she graduated with honors in 1995. She was ordained to the diaconate in June 1995 by the Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee at All Saints, Richmond.

She served as an assistant rector at St. Stephen's, Richmond, where she was ordained to the priesthood in January 1996.

In 1997, she and her family moved to the Diocese of Christ the King, South Africa, where she became priest-in-charge of St. Francis, Walkerville. In August 2000, she returned to the United States to become rector of Memorial Church in Baltimore, Md., until May of 2014.

In the Diocese of Maryland, she has served as chair of the Commission on Ministry. She was a mentor to the new Episcopal Service Corps of young adults and served as a deputy to General Convention in Indianapolis in 2012. Martha now serves as rector of Emmanuel Parish in Cumberland, Maryland.

Martha is married to Bryan Kelleher. Martha and Bryan have two children: Jack, age 29, and Anna, age 26. Martha's interests include swimming, tennis, golf, gardening and reading.

The Rev. Helen Svoboda-Barber Rector, St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Durham, North Carolina



The Rev. Helen Svoboda-Barber grew up in Chapman, Kan., and graduated with degrees in psychology and human development from the University of Kansas. Her Masters of Divinity is from the Seminary of the Southwest, and her Doctor of Ministry is from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, both in Austin, Texas.

Before going to seminary, Helen was a researcher at the Center for the Influences of Television on Children and was a registered representative at Twentieth Century Mutual Funds (now American Century).

Helen spent three years as curate then canon at Grace Cathedral, Topeka; three years as assistant pastor at Holy Cross ELCA in Overland Park; 10 years as rector of Harcourt Parish in Gambier, Ohio; and has been rector of St. Luke's in Durham, N.C., since 2014.

She is active in all levels of the church, including as convocation president (Kansas), diocesan Christian Education Chair (Ohio), Credentials Committee (North Carolina),

Council of Advice for the President of the House of Deputies, and several-time deputy to General Convention.

She has been on the Executive Committees of the Topeka Center for Peace and Justice (Kansas), Interchurch Social Services (Ohio) and Latino Education Achievement Program (North Carolina).

She and her husband, Shawn, are parents to Charlie, 14, and Luke, 11. Helen enjoys board games, reading, weaving and needlework, and she loves time spent with her family.

July 1, 2018—Update:

The petition process for the 10th bishop of the Diocese of Kansas ended at 5 p.m. on Saturday, June 30, 2018. At least one nomination by petition was received.

After materials are checked and the required background check is complete, any additional candidates will be announced by the Council of Trustees, most likely in August.

The bishop election will take place at Grace Cathedral, Topeka, on Oct. 19, the first day of Diocesan Convention. Plans are for the election to be live streamed. A service of ordination and consecration is scheduled for Saturday, March 2, 2019, at Grace Cathedral.

Even now the warrior ones of this world know this hatred even as He did "If the world hates you, realize it hated me first."



The Feast Day of Mary Magdalene, First Witness of the Resurrection July 22

Mary Magdalene is mentioned in the Gospels as being among the women of Galilee who followed Jesus and His disciples, and who was present at His Crucifixion and Burial, and who went to the tomb on Easter Sunday to anoint His body. She was the first to see the Risen Lord, and to announce His Resurrection to the apostles. Accordingly, she is referred to in early Christian writings as "the apostle to the apostles."

Almighty God, whose blessed Son restored Mary Magdalene to health of body and mind, and called her to be a witness of his resurrection: Mercifully grant that by your grace we may be healed of all our infirmities and know you in the power of his endless life; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.
