

On Pentecost, we remember when the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus' disciples. As they gathered in Jerusalem 10 days after Jesus' ascension, they saw tongues of fire, heard rushing wind and began speaking in many languages. Because the disciples could then share the good news with all the pilgrims assembled for the Pentecost festival, the occasion marks the birthday of the Christian church. That day alone, about 3,000 people devoted their lives to Christ.

Like the Holy Spirit, Pentecost is important and relevant today. As theologian Henri Nouwen writes, "Without Pentecost the Christ-event — the life, death and resurrection of Jesus — remains imprisoned in history as something to remember, think about and reflect on. The Spirit of Jesus comes to dwell within us, so that we can become living Christs here and now."

Transitions from One Rector to Another Have Changed

• The number of applicants for clergy positions will be fewer than in years gone by.

• Clergy are less willing or able to relocate.

• More clergy are trained through local or distance-learning models like Bishop Kemper School for Ministry, and fewer through traditional seminary settings.

• Many clergy have already had a first career before responding to a call to the priesthood.

- The diocesan transition minister, Debbie Kremers, will be our guide and support throughout this process.
- The church requires background checks on candidates.
- The bishop must approve your choice of a new clergy leader.

While we are not nearly ready to begin a search, we must remember that "calling" a priest is much more than "hiring" one. The best calls happen when the Holy Spirit is part of the process. Seeking new clergy leadership is a spiritual process, not an executive search. But until we know who we are and what we want to be as a parish, we are not ready to seek a new rector. Fr. Richard Osborne, our interim priest, is trained and experienced in leading congregations in this project. It will begin with a Vestry Retreat on June 4. The Parish Council will meet on Saturday, June 11 at 10 A.M. We are interested in knowing what our expectations and priorities are for ourselves and our leadership.

Update from the Vestry

We will be meeting on June 12 for our monthly meeting. If there is anything that you want us to discuss, please let any member know or email me.

We are having a Vestry Retreat June 4th, Saturday at 10 AM. Father Richard will be assisting our discussion of St. Matthews direction in the next years to come.

We are having our Quarterly Parish Council Meeting on June 11th.

The Vestry will having a Zoom Meeting on June 13th with Bishop Bascom to discuss the future plans of the Rectory. We are trying to decide what to do with the Rectory. We could keep it and would have to make some needed repairs for the next Priest. Bishop Bascom believes that having a Rectory would be a big selling point in finding our next Priest. Or, we could sell it or rent it . The PEF owns 1/2 of the Rectory, so they will be involved. Still, we want your ideas on what is best to do with the Rectory.

If you have any thoughts about St Matthews, we are open to suggestions regarding the church, services and outreach programs.

We still need volunteers for so many aspects of St Matthews Sunday Service. Please consider where you would like to serve.




Growing Earth Stewards: Enjoying the natural world

With the weather warming up, it's a good time to get out and enjoy the natural world all around us. There are many state parks and nature preserves here in Kansas including some areas of prairie preservation and restoration like the Konza Prairie outside Manhattan and the Tallgrass Prairie National Preserve near Council Grove. These sites allow us to experience the prairie grasslands the way they were in centuries past and to see some of the last remaining areas of tallgrass prairie.

The Land Use mini of the Care of Creation Task Force has created a guide to natural areas that we can all explore as pilgrimages. They have identified several sites in each of the convocations "which are demonstrating three principles: restoration of native plants, incorporation of creation sensitive practices, and hospitality to the surrounding community." All are welcome to visit these places and see the variety of natural places in our diocese.
