Meanings of Advent

Christmas is the **"most wonderful time of the year":** trees are trimmed, presents wrapped, and the chilly air signals the coming season of festive warmth. But did you know we're not really ready for Christmas without first observing a **"little Lent?"** This season looks at ways to **"deck the halls"** of our hearts – and prepare our bodies and our homes – for the birth of Christ by preparing for Him in the season of Advent.

A Brief History of Advent

The season of Advent developed in the Church over time. Here are ten facts that you may not know about the roots and meaning of Advent.

- 1. Advent is the time of expectation and preparation for the birth of the Lord
- 2. Advent has a changing start date. For us, this year, it starts on November 27th.
- 3. Advent marks the beginning of the Liturgical year.
- 4. The Advent season has two meanings.
- 5. Hope is the predominant theme of Advent.
- 6. Advent is a reminder of the Old Testament promises of the coming of the Messiah.
- 7. Advent focuses on light as opposed to darkness.
- 8. Advent has two parts.
- 9. The origins of Advent can be traced back to the church in France.
- 10. Advent as we know it today was developed in Rome.

Advent is the season that begins four Sundays before December 25. Advent lasts a short four weeks and prepares us for Christmas, right? Shopping for presents, decorating the tree, singing carols, making gingerbread houses, sending cards, enjoying holiday parties, "**making a list...and checking it twice.**" There's a lot to it.

Christmas is Christ entering our world and Advent is expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation and joyful preparation for God coming into our lives and hearts, in all moments, all places, all times, past, present, and future, commemorating the birth of Jesus, welcoming God into our lives every day, and preparing for Christ's **second coming!**

Advent prepares us for these events and reminds us there is joy in waiting and even begins a new year for the Church!

Advent is not waiting in line to see Santa, rushing around shopping, or a race to December 25th.

Advent is different from Lent because it is a season of **"hope"** not repentance.

Lent is a spring cleaning of our lives...hope in Advent is a cozier time, like getting your home ready to welcome a special guest... **Jesus.** He is the one we've been waiting for!

The Advent colors are not Red & Green but Purple & Rose, like the candles in the Advent Wreath. A new candle is lit each week. The third week is Rose... for **"Gaudate"** Sunday. Gaudate is the Latin word for **Rejoice**, don't lose heart. The expected guest has almost arrived!

Remember, Advent isn't about shopping, stressing, planning or buying; it's about expecting, waiting, hoping, and praying.

If you're sick of Christmas by December 25th. you haven't done Advent correctly.

This Advent, add some meaning to your waiting. Volunteer at a hospital or, at our church, spend some extra time in prayer, be patient with your family, count down the days with an Advent Calendar, speak kindly to strangers, go to church, and, ... share **hope** with those who need it most while you wait for that special guest born in a manger!

Have a wonderful, meaningful Advent





A shoot brings life

Last year, Israeli scientists harvested dates from seeds that had been dormant about 2,000 years. The seeds, recovered during archaeological digs, were nurtured in incubators and several thrived. One (named Methuselah!) became a 10-foot-tall palm tree.

Horticulturists joked about marketing "dates that Jesus ate," but there's another scriptural connection. Isaiah 11, a traditional Advent reading, prophesies: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots" (verse 1, NRSV). Jesus is the tender shoot that emerged from the humble peasant origins of Jesse, father of King David. From a dynasty that went dormant due to Israel's sins sprouted a mighty tree, who will someday usher in a reign of peace (see verses 6-7).

Some people and churches celebrate Christmas with a Jesse Tree, remembering how God sent Jesus to sprout life out of death and bring new hope and joy to the world.

The journey begins at Advent

When Advent begins on November 27 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."
