Advent Traditions

I've always thought about Advent as a time of reflection, quietness, and preparation. It is observed by many Christians as a period of prayer, fasting, and repentance, followed by anticipation, hope, and joy. I read that originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas. But by the 6th century, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming back into the world.

Wondering about how I could spend this Advent season "preparing", got me thinking about how we prepare here at St. Matthew's during Advent. How, as a faithful people, do we honor this time preparing for the coming of the baby Jesus? What are the traditions here at St. Matthew's that are observed at Advent?

The following are some of the traditions I have come to love while here at St. Matthew's.

The first tradition to begin the Advent Season is the lighting of the Advent Wreath. We have a beautiful stand for the blue Advent candles that get lit each Sunday of Advent until the 4th Sunday of Advent when the rose candle is lit. Then on Christmas Eve, the white Christ candle is lit. We have a reading and prayer while the candles are being lit. It's a great start to our worship time.

The next tradition that has been started here at St. Matthew's, usually on the 3rd Sunday of Advent, is the service of Lessons and Carols. I love this service where several scripture passages are read by various readers each followed by an Advent/ Christmas carol sung by the congregation.

Also on the 3rd Sunday of Advent every year, we have Hanging of the Greens when the members of the church get together and decorate the tree, and the altar, and put the candles up for the Christmas Eve service. The decorations always seem plain and simple at first glance but are considered beautiful and festive, ready for Christmas Eve once completed. We work together getting all these decorations up and then enjoy snacks to finish off the work.. It's a joyous time watching the church being decorated so beautifully.

At St. Matthew's we also have the tradition of displaying poinsettias in honor or memory of a loved one or for blessings received. You can donate towards these poinsettias and they are placed on or around the altar and church during the Christmas season. On the night of the Christmas Eve service, the loved ones are named in the bulletin. These poinsettias really beautify the sanctuary. Then after the Christmas season, everyone is invited to take some of the poinsettia plants home to keep alive!

The next tradition is the Christmas Eve service. If you talk to some of those church members who have grown up at St. Matthew's, they will tell you that we used to have the service at or around Midnight, like the traditional Episcopalians; but over the years that has changed. The Christmas Eve service now starts at 7:00 pm with 30 minutes of music and continues with the Holy Eucharist at 7:30 pm. At the beginning of the Christmas Eve service, a young child carries the baby Jesus and places him in the manger at the altar. This is a beautiful service, ending with a candlelight service while singing Joy to the World!

Even though it is after Advent, another tradition here at St. Matthew's is an Epiphany party to celebrate the Magi coming to see the baby Jesus bringing gifts. We have a white elephant gift exchange and usually a King's Cake spending a fun time together with our church family. In the last few years, we have also begun to do the act of Chalking the Door for the new year.

I love all these traditions. Can you think about other traditions that you have loved here at St. Matthew's? Forward your memories to me and I can put them in the next Messenger. We have so much to be thankful for and these traditions help us display this thankfulness to each other.

I hope you find ways to spend this Advent in quiet reflection to help you prepare for Christmas.





Join us for a group study during Advent at 9:00 am every Sunday morning in the lounge. Books are available at the church.




Help to decorate the church altar and sanctuary by donating towards Poinsettias. You can give in honor of a loved one, in memory, or for other thanksgivings.

Bring a dish to share. Hope you can be here for this joyful celebration.






LET'S FILL UP THE ST. MATTHEW'S FOOD PANTRY.

Dutch Catholic priest and theologian Henri Nouwen found it useful to reflect on several questions at the end of the day: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to some-one's face? Did I say words of healing?" Pondering such questions may prove valuable at the end of a year as well: "How did I contribute to peace in the world this past year? Did I bring smiles to others' faces? Did I offer words of healing?" Nouwen continued, and we can too: "Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love?"

Many of us set New Year's resolutions for self-improvement, asking, "What are my goals? How can I better myself, my weight, my work-life balance, my habits?" But Nouwen said of his self-inquiry: "These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and [in] the life to come." His resolution was to share God's love with others. With God's help, it can be ours as well, for each new day and each new year.
