Cleaning the Clutter

I don't know if you have an extra bedroom in your home. Perhaps it's your craft or project room, or maybe it's a guest bedroom. Or perhaps, like one of the rooms in my house, it is the room where everything goes when you don't know where it belongs. The result can be a very messy and cluttered place where the door stays closed almost all the time.

When I bought my house, I dreamed of having a wonderful guest room. But it wasn't too long before I realized that the room had gotten filled with boxes of belongings from our daughter who stored things with us, plus many of our own odds and ends. It was hardly a welcoming place, and I was always careful not to leave the door open when guests arrived. Somehow in the nine years that I have lived in that house that room never quite became the guest room I'd imagined. My struggle with clearing a cluttered room is hardly unique. In fact, I think there are times when our lives feel just as cluttered and disorganized.

We wish we could just close the door and hide all the garbage and brokenness in our lives from others. When I read the story in Luke 4 where Jesus meets Levi (or Matthew) the tax collector and invites him to become a disciple, I am struck by how quickly Levi is willing to invite Jesus not only into his home, but also into the disorder of his life. There was something in Jesus' look and words that made Levi want to welcome him and be changed by him.

During this Lenten and Easter season, we are being invited to once again to look into the "room" of our lives. Where might a little cleaning help? Is there someone I need to forgive? How's my relationship with God? What do I need to confess? It may seem almost overwhelming on some days. Lots of issues and things can clutter our lives and make it difficult to welcome Jesus, but Levi's story reminds us that Jesus loves and calls to us right where we are – good or bad.

As we journey through this sacred season of the year, may it be a time in which we again feel the warm glow of Jesus' presence in every area of our lives.

And, as we go about our work and ministry in our St. Matthew's community, may the promise and hope of Jesus' loving call be shared with all who need to experience it..



Senior Warden Report – February 2023 Maggie Snow

First of all, I want to thank you all for the trust you have placed in me by nominating and voting for me to be Senior Warden for St. Matthew's. It means a lot to me to hold this position of trust, and I will strive to always be conscious of that position and the responsibilities it entails. We all love St. Matthew's and have its best interests at heart, and I am excited for the improvements we have made so far and for setting us on firm ground to move forward into the future!

We have several items in the coming months that need immediate attention from the St. Matthew's family, and I want to make sure we all are aware of them so we can work towards completing them successfully.

First up, the Outreach Committee is running our Souper Bowl of Caring Campaign now through February 12th. This campaign was started by the NFL Alumni Association and St. Matthew's has been participating in it for many years. Tackling hunger is more important than ever, as Kansas Health Matters released numbers for 2020 indicating that 10.3% of families in Harvey County (just over 1,330 families) don't have enough food to eat. While many of us like to think that hunger isn't a problem in rural areas like Harvey County, that is simply not true; Hunger Relief Organization Feeding America notes that 11% of families in rural areas faced hunger or food insecurity in 2021. Rising inflation and the ending of several Covid-related benefit programs such as the Child Tax Credit are contributing to rises in these numbers. Between now and February 12th, we are collecting donations of prepared soup (canned or boxed) or monetary donations to support Souper Bowl for Caring. Please bring your offerings to the church before February 12th and help us tackle hunger in Newton! All donations will go to the Salvation Army Food Bank.

Speaking of food, Lent is fast approaching, and that means our 83rd Annual Pancake Supper! The Pancake Supper will be held on Mardi Gras (AKA Fat Tuesday/ Shrove Tuesday), which is February 21st this year. We

need volunteers to help bring ingredients for the food, distribute tickets for sale, take tickets at the door, prepare and serve the food as well as help clean up after the dinner is over. Sign up sheets will be made available soon, so please watch for them and sign up!

I am also still seeking volunteers to sit on the Mission Statement Subcommittee. This subcommittee will work on updating the Mission Statement for St. Matthew's to align it with our new Vision Statement and help us align our efforts and programs towards accomplishing our Vision.

Our new Vision Statement is:

St. Matthew's Episcopal Church is living into God's vision for us as a beloved community and disciples of Christ. We are always growing in relationship with God, embracing our neighborhood and our world, and leading through acts of service as a beacon of God's justice and love.

If you can lend your time and talents to helping us craft a Mission Statement that will explain how we will seek to make our vision a reality, please contact me. I would like to get the subcommittee started working by the end of February.

The Book of Common Prayer contains "instructions" for public worship.

The first Book of Common Prayer was created in England more than 350 years ago, with a goal of rendering the prayers of worship in the language of the gathered people instead of the language of the educated elite.

This tradition of common-language worship continues today and the Book of Common Prayer has been translated into nearly every spoken language on earth. The most recent revision of the Book of Common Prayer in the Episcopal Church was in 1979 and allowed for the choice of either "traditional" or modern language.

The BCP provides liturgical forms, prayers, and instructions so that all members and orders of the Episcopal Church may appropriately share in common worship. The first American BCP was ratified by the first General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 1789. Future revisions were in 1892, 1928, and then finally in 1979. On July 10, 2018, at General Convention, the Episcopal Church voted to begin revising its Book of Common Prayer to move toward more inclusive language for God. But it may not be until 2030 that this is complete.

Epiphany Party

We had a great time at the Epiphany Party on Sunday, January 8. We enjoyed snacks and a King's Cake. Everyone joined in on a White Elephant gift exchange/game, which was a lot of fun. We also continued the tradition of Chalking the Door (which our Senior Warden, Rick Glover did admirably!). This is a blessing of the church, on whose lintels are inscribed the cross of salvation, together with the indication of the year and the initials of the three wise men (20+C+M+B+23), which can also be interpreted to as *Christus Mansionem Benedicat* which means 'May Christ bless this house'.





Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.

We observe Lent because it tells us to STOP and rest awhile — and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to LOOK inward for an honest self-examination, to look upward to see the cross of Jesus with healing and love, and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent be-

cause it tells us to LISTEN — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent

People do not light a lamp and put it under the bushel basket; rather, they put it on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.
