The father was crushed. He put his arms around his little son, and he begged for his forgiveness.



Why it matters to exercise your brain

According to Rebecca Marcus, LCSW, a licensed psychotherapist in New York who specializes in mindfulness, brain games are important for several reasons:

- They can help to increase focus, concentration, and memory.
- They can help us to be more present in day-to-day activities.
- While it doesn't appear that brain games can prevent agerelated cognitive decline and dementia, growing research indicates that they may slow or delay them.

"We are more likely to feel scattered, have trouble focusing, or experience forgetfulness if we don't do things to exercise and keep our mind sharp," says Marcus. "Just like we wouldn't expect to go to the gym for 3 months and then forever have muscles and strength without continuing to exercise, the same applies to exercising our mind."

Besides brain games, she says another way to challenge your brain is simply by varying your regular routines or tasks. For example, if you take your dog for a walk on the same route every day, try going in a different direction one day. (See? Easy!) You'll also want to challenge both sides of your brain.


The left brain is known to perform tasks related to logic, such as science and mathematics, whereas the right brain is more visual and intuitive. Games like Sudoku and puzzles are great for challenging the left side of the brain.

On the other hand, to strengthen the right side of your brain, you'll want to "keep your emotional intelligence sharp by engaging in conversations where you evoke and attune to the emotions of others," says Sarah Schewitz, PsyD, a licensed psychologist in Los Angeles.

You can also try new creative hobbies such as:

- painting
- photography
- creative writing
- playing music or learning to play an instrument

Everyone, young and old, benefits from playing games and doing puzzles. Maybe its time to plan a game night with your friends and family! What is your favorite puzzle or game? Scrabble, Sudoku, chess, crosswords, or something else?




Fun and Interesting Facts about the Episcopal Church

Pentecost and Season after Pentecost (Ordinary Time), Year A (2017, 2020, 2023, etc.)

The word Pentecost comes from the Greek meaning fiftieth day. This was the Greek name for the Hebrew Feast of Weeks, which took place fifty days after Passover. The Hebrew festival commemorated the calling of the Hebrew people into covenant with God at Mount Sinai. The new Christians kept this name because this was the same day the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles. The church saw this as the beginning of a new covenant relationship between the followers of Jesus and God. This new relationship is summarized by the prophet Jeremiah, "I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts." (Jeremiah 31:33)

We begin the season with two Feast days: Pentecost, followed by Trinity Sunday. Then we move on to the long season known as Ordinary Time, which runs through Christ the King Sunday. As we take this journey, nourished by the scriptures appointed for the season and empowered by our baptisms, we are invited to be on the lookout for all the blessings found in the ordinary – to see God at work here and now. And we are compelled to share our blessings with others.

We remain Easter people, now with the wind of the Holy Spirit in our sails. Our task for the months ahead in this season of Ordinary Time, which extends to the end of November, is to look at what Jesus so tenaciously taught his disciples and see what is in these teachings for us as we carry out the work we have been given to do. Jesus promised his disciples a helper, an Advocate, who would stand with them making the work possible. This same helper, the Holy Spirit, hovers over us still eager to quench the fire of fear and replace it with the powerful energy of love.
