Little Chad was a shy, quiet young fella. One day he came home and told his mother. He'd like to make a valentine for everyone in his class. Her heart sank. She thought, *I wish he wouldn't do that!* because she had watched the children when they walked home from school. Her Chad was always behind them. They laughed and hung on to each other and talked to each other. But Chad was never included. Nevertheless, she decided she would go along with her son. So she purchased the paper and glue and crayons. For three whole weeks, night after night, Chad painstakingly made thirty-five valentine's.

Valentine's Day dawned., and Chad was beside himself with excitement! He carefully stacked them up, put them in a bag, and bolted out the door. His mom decided to bake him his favorite cookies and serve them up warm and nice with a cool glass of milk when he came home from school. She just knew he would be disappointed...maybe that would ease the pain a little. It hurt her to think that he wouldn't get many valentine's – maybe none at all.


That afternoon she had the cookies and milk on the table. When she heard the children outside she looked out the window. Sure enough here they came, laughing and having the best time. And, as always, there was Chad in the rear. He walked a little faster than usual. She fully expected him to burst into tears as soon as he got inside. His arms were empty, she noticed, and when the door opened, she choked back the tears.

"Mommy has some warm cookies and milk for you."

But he hardly heard her words. He just marched right on by, his face aglow, and all he could say was: "Not a one… not a one." And then he added, "I didn't forget a one, not a single one!"

Doctor Victor E. Frankel, survivor of three grim years at Auschwitz and other Nazi prisons, has recorded his observation on life in Hitler's camps:

We who lived in concentration camps can remember the men who walked through the huts. Comforting others, giving away their last piece of bread. They have been few in number, but they offer sufficient proof that everything can be taken from a man but one thing: The last of the human freedoms — to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances, to choose one's own way.

CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash

Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes



were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."




Hot Times in the Heartland Documentary Preview Rescheduled for Feb. 25 at 2 pm

Bishop Cathleen Bascom is among those featured in a new, feature-length documentary entitled "Hot Times in the Heartland." The documentary spotlights individuals and organizations directly involved with research and implementation of approaches designed to mitigate the impact of climate change and to help communities develop more resilience as we adapt to changing conditions. The documentary explores a range of activities taking place primarily within the Kaw Valley of Kansas and the metropolitan Kansas City area. Bishop Bascom describes the current situation as a "Kairos moment" for Earth stewardship and shares how the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas is responding through the Creation Trustees Network and the ministries of Bethany House & Garden.



Members of the diocese are invited to attend a screening of the documentary on Sunday, February 25 at 2 pm at Grace Cathedral, Topeka in All Saints Hall. The film will be shown in its entirety, and there will be a discussion facilitated by the bishop and producer Dave Kendall, former host of the "Sunflower Journeys" series on public television. Diocesan-Wide Book Study After Easter

Bishop Bascom invites the diocese to participate in a collective read of the Rev. Dr. Sam Wells' <u>Humbler Faith, Bigger God: Finding a Story to Live By</u>. The book is currently backordered at Amazon, but used copies may be found.

St. Matthew's will begin the study on the First Sunday after Easter at 9:00 A.M. in the Lounge.

Each of the ten chapters in *Humbler Faith*, *Bigger God* considers a timely and timeless criticism of Christianity or the Church. Wells tells the "old, old story" of traditional, orthodox Christianity before challenging it with the criticism of the "rival story – what an educated, rational, contemporary

person would generally think." Wells concludes each chapter with "a story to live by," a response to both the "old, old," and the "rival," that serves "as a constructive vision for a renewed Christian faith."

The Rev. Dr. Samuel Wells is vicar of St. Martin-in- the-Fields, London, and will speak at the 2024 Tocher Lecture on May 15-16 at St. Michael and All Angels, Mission.
