Greed Versus Generosity


Giving generously out of abundance is one thing, but to give up all one has to live on is quite another. Such an act goes against all we hear about sound money management and retirement planning. It also challenges the prevailing attitude that the possession of material wealth determines the status of a person in their community.

It is difficult to think of too many people who would give up their money as freely as the widow from Mark's gospel did who put in all she had. As Jesus was teaching in the temple, he contrasted the greed of the scribes with the generosity of a poor widow. Whereas the scribes took advantage of widows for their own gain, the poor widow placed all that she had into the treasury.

Jesus noticed her act of generosity; he lifted her up as a model disciple because she was not attached to her small amount of wealth. Instead, she was willing to contribute what she had for the greater common purpose. Even though she put her own future at risk, she had the impulse to give what she had for the sake of others rather than worry about her financial security in the future.

In the early years of Christianity, some communities of disciples continued to live according to a similar spirit of generosity. They put all their money into a common purse so that no one would be in need. Their lifestyle gained the attention of the culture and attracted new people into their communities.

Our churches do not ask us to put everything we have to live on into the offering plate as a requirement for membership in the body of Christ. As each of us searches our heart to discern how much we are willing to give up for the sake of others, let us also remember that God abundantly provides everything we need.

FROM YOUR CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE

We began the Capital Campaign in the Fall of 2024 with a goal of creating a \$100,000 fund to provide needed updates to our church facility and to set aside enough money to replace our 25 year old primary HVAC unit when it is no longer functional (it requires Freon for the AC).

Our financial goal has essentially been met with about \$95,000 in donations and pledges. We continue to perform important upgrades to our building as described below.

An important reminder for those of you who have made annual pledges to the campaign: The first year of our three year campaign will be complete as of September 30th. If you have not made your first year donation as yet, please do so in the near future.

The campaign work started with replacing floors in bathrooms and kitchen and redoing plumbing in the women's bathroom. The ceiling in the Parish Hall was repaired and last month the broken heat pumps in two classrooms were replaced.

The next two projects will be more noticeable. The exterior of the church will be repainted. This involves some caulking and repair but the refreshed paint will brighten the appearance and will catch your eye. How soon that will be completed is dependent on weather.

The other planned redo is to replace lights that illuminate the Altar in the Chapel and two fixtures that will give better light directed at the Altar in the Nave. When those two projects are completed, the capital campaign funds will be held to cover the replacement of the main HVAC system.

While pondering differences between patriotism and nationalism, Ryan Hamm looks to Jesus' example in Luke 19:41-44. "Jesus, it seems, loved his people, his city, his nation — so much so that he cried over it," he writes in Christianity Today. "He didn't despise his country or wish ill upon it — instead, he wanted nothing but the best for it, and it grieved him to see how his people had rejected his teachings."

This example of "patriotism perfected" can serve as a guide for modern-day Christians, according to Hamm. "It's an example that's both pragmatic and romantic, shot through with justice, truth and love. It's not a nationalistic patriotism — it's a love for nation that doesn't pit it against other nations. Instead, it's a recognition of love followed by a mournful recognition of shortcomings."

Put another way, God doesn't love America more than any other nation. And he doesn't want us to worship our nation alongside him, because that is idolatry. Instead, we are to love and proclaim God above any earthly realm. The following lines are from a long prayer, "That America Fulfil the Promise of Its Founding," by Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan. Though written in 1945, it rings true yet today. (Full text at https://tinyurl.com/nhc8747x.)

O God, who is Liberator and Redeemer, Lawgiver and Judge, ...

May America remain loyal to the principles of the Declaration of Independence, and extend their application to ever -widening areas of life.

Keep out of our life all manner of oppression, persecution, and unjust discrimination; save us from religious, racial and class conflicts; may our country be a haven of refuge to the victims of injustice and misrule.

Instruct us in the art of living together, of reconciling differences of opinion and averting clashes of interest, of helping one another to achieve a harmonious and abundant life ...

That the Star-Spangled Banner, the symbol of our American democracy, may ever wave o'er the land of the free and the home of the brave. Amen.




Education for Ministry (or as it's better known, EfM) is a program for adults who desire to grow deeper into scripture, church history and theology in a small group.

would like to have Jerry add to the schedule for Sunday Worship.


These songs will be worked in during the summer months. Can't wait to hear your favorite hymns!
